### **LECTURE**

There will be a lecture at ZSO Dar e Mehr (MGDM) - 3590 Bayview Ave., North York, on Sunday September 29, 2019 after the Maidyozarem Gahambar Jashan by Professor Dr. Jesse Palsetia. The talk will commence at 2 pm after lunch. The title of the talk will be "The Great and the Average: Understanding Parsi History".

Professor Jesse Palsetia is a historian of India and the British Empire. He is a specialist in the history of Parsis of India and the history of the Bombay city. After graduating, he finished his doctorate at University of Toronto and has been a Professor in the Department of History at University of Guelph. His research interests are Study of South Asia and British imperialism. He is the author of Jamshedjee Jejeebhoy of Bombay: Partnership and Public culture in Empire, New Delhi: Oxford University Press 2015 and Parsis of India: Preservation of Identity in Bombay city. Leiden: Brill 2001: reprint Manoher publications, 2008. In addition, he has published several articles and book chapters on Parsis.

In his talk at ZSO he will examine how historians have understood and not understood the writings of Parsi history. We look forward with interest to a large attendance to understand our own history.

### SHAHENSHAHI MUKTAD

The Shahenshahi Muktads were celebrated at the OZCF. During the 5 Gatha days 3 satums were performed. Every morning there was the Baj ceremony performed by Ervad Jamshed Dhabhar. In the house one can see the Pavi within which the Baj was performed. Every day early in the morning apart from the breakfast Satums, the Afringan and the Farokshi prayers were performed. After every prayer, we would have the "Muktad no Namaskar" prayers that the whole congregation would chant together. We also had the midnight prayers on the final Gatha to bid farewell for our dearly departed souls, feeding them the "bhatiyu" and bidding them goodbye and thanking them for their blessings.

Muktad are the days of communication between the material and spiritual worlds – our need of health, happiness, peace and prosperity is fulfilled through the blessings of the souls and the Fravashis, and their need for our remembrance is fulfilled by our prayers and invocations.

Every evening, after the Satum, we had some valuable insights being provided to us:

- Mobedyar Khushroo Mirza talked about the link between Ahunavar (i.e. Yatha Vairyo prayer) and Ahunavaiti Gatha.
- Considering Ahura Mazda as a "Creator of Wisdom" rather than a "person" should be the way of thinking for Zoroastrians; this was put forth by Er Kobad Zarolia.
- Ervad Jal Panthaky talked about the significance of the Satum.

This was followed by singing parts of the Gathas and this was done by Khurshed Patel who led the singing and Hozi Patel who gave the musical accompaniment.

One of the Gatha days also celebrates the 6th and the last Gahambar, the Hamaspathmaedhem gahambar. According to Zoroastrian religion, each of the 6 creations was created during one of the Gahambars. Mankind is associated with this the last Gahambar. This year, the Gahambar ceremony was held on the 3rd day, Spentomard Gatha. The successful completion of another Muktad would not have been possible without the participation of our community. A big thank you to one and all who participated on these days, thus making our efforts worthwhile. It was indeed very heartening to see a regular turnout of more than 125 people every evening. And it was especially heartening to see the youth and the younger generations participating in the festivity. Indeed, Zoroastrianism will survive and prosper for eons to come.

### NAVROZE & KHORDAD SAL JASHAN



This was the first Congress with more female speakers. This was emphasized with two female panels on 'How women will modernize the world's oldest religion' and 'Women in Business and Entrepreneurship'. The 'Zoroastrians in Media' panel highlighted struggles our friends faced in Hollywood, when during the initial phase of their careers many colleagues had never heard of Zoroastrianism. The fault somehow lies with us for not conveying our story or being shy of our identities. All panelists were unanimous that everyone they spoke to was eager to learn more about our religion and culture and accepted them whole heartedly. They highlighted steps they are taking to spread awareness about our religion using the power of media.

The young mobeds panel raised discussions on key topics within the community such as conversions, acceptance of spouses from outside the faith and navjotes for children of interfaith marriages. Both orthodox and liberal views were presented with rational arguments. With such sensitive issues, it was immensely pleasing to see the respectful way in which the discussion was conducted, and all questions were answered.

A highly anticipated panel was the LGBTQ discussion. We learnt about traditional Zoroastrian views and the hardships faced by our friends just because of their personal choices. Examining Zoroastrian scriptures and backed by Ervad Tehemton Mirza from Ontario, made it clear that Zoroastrianism is a religion of spreading positivity and all-inclusiveness. An intense Q&A followed, and it was pleasing to see the positive and accepting atmosphere from the audience. Everyone was highly appreciative of the courage exhibited by the members of this panel to share their personal stories to an audience of over 350 individuals.

It wasn't all lectures though! Spending time at L.A. attractions Santa Monica Pier and Hollywood, Bohemian Rhapsody movie night, comedy and dance night, 4th of July boat cruise and a formal gala were part of the itinerary. Besides these, a large number of youths would be at the pool during the day or by the courtyard fireplace well into the night.

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### **BASIC FAQS ON ZOROASTRIANISM**

### 15). Are there different Calendars being observed by Zoroastrians?

There are currently three main calendars in use: Shahenshāhi, Qadimi and Fasli. These are based on the use of different modes of computing. The Shahenshāhi (traditional) and the Qadimi (ancient) use a "non-intercalating" calendar of 365 days. However, their New Years are one full month of 30 days apart. The Fasli (seasonal) calendar is a religious calendar (Dini Sal) which is based on the seasons by intercalating one day every four years of 365 days, 5 hours, 48 minutes and 45.5 seconds. The New Year always begins on the first day of Spring, on or about March 21st.

### 16). What are the Zoroastrian Observances?

Two sacred garments, the sudreh (shirt) and the kusti (cord) are the emblems of the religion. The short cleansing ritual is known as the Padyab. It involves untying and retying the kusti several times a day. Other obligatory prayers are recited several times daily from the Khordeh Avestā. Prayers are mainly composed in the Avestā language with some segments in Pazand - a language that evolved in a later era. The devotees are also expected to participate in the seasonal festivals of "Gahambars" during the annual cycle.

### 17). What is a Fravashi?

Fravashi is known as the guardian spirit. It is the spark of the creating force Mazda. It is the highest of all Divine principles in the human constitution. Fravashi is the spiritual guide for the soul in its physical existence. Fravashi also provides light, knowledge and energy to the physical matter.

### 18). Why do Zoroastrians pray in front of a fire?

Fire is the provider of heat and light and is the source of life and growth. Fire or any source of light represents Ahura Mazda's divine light and energy. Fire is also a symbol of "Asha" and the "original light of God" and holds a special place of esteem in the religion. Hence, the prayer is often performed in front of a fire. All consecrated fires are kept perpetually burning in the major fire temples. Consecrated fires are believed to be the very incarnation of Creator – Ahura Mazda. So, when we pray before a fire, we are paying homage to the Creator, the creation that represents life and the inherent nature of Ahura Mazda – total goodness. FIRE is variously interpreted as the fire of inspiration, the fire of love, the fire of righteousness, the fire of emotion, the fire of compassion, the fire of devotion, the fire of the life-giving force in all of Mazda's creations.

### 19). What are the three grades of fire?

The three grades of fire among the Zoroastrians are the Ātash Behrām, the Ātash Ādarān and the Ātash Dādgāh.

### 20). How are the different grades of fire installed?

Sixteen different kinds of fire are required to install an Ātash Behrām. An Ātash Ādarān requires four different fires for installation and an Ātash Dādgāh can be installed with just one household fire. These various fires are installed after performing elaborate consecration ceremonies in all cases.

### 21). What is "Asha"?

In search for Truth, Zarathushtra identified a Divine order in Nature which he designated as Asha. No word in English can adequately describe Asha. It is loosely translated as truth, righteousness, world-order, eternal law, etc. Asha is the order that governs the natural activities such as the rising and setting of the sun, the waxing and waning of the moon, the rise and fall of tides, the day and night going about their daily cycle and non-stop seasonal changes which take place.
